Purpose: Using a **System of Care** approach, the Eastern Iowa MH/DS Region will complete a **Sequential Intercept Mapping (SIM)** exercise to increase collaboration between institutions. At the conclusion of the workshop a **Community Action Plan** will be developed, and a **Cross-Disciplinary Team** will be established to oversee children's services.

At this 2-Day Workshop we will review the results of the community mapping exercise completed in January 2023.

Following review of cross-sector feedback we will further narrow our WISH LIST OF SERVICES (by Intercept) and conduct a SWOT analysis of our choices. Existing services/programs will be mapped by intercept and functional work teams will be developed to move services forward in Clinton, Jackson, Cedar, Muscatine, and Scott Counties.

Objectives:

At the completion of the program, participants will be able to:

1. Evaluate how communities can work together, utilizing support and resiliency focused programs to intervene with youth experiencing mental health and behavioral issues.
2. Describe how communities who employ early detection systems for children with behavioral health needs are reducing downstream more intensive services.
3. Examine how increasing effective connections to appropriate and integrated services in the community lead to better outcomes for youth and families.
4. Analyze how a public health model can be applied to the Sequential Intercept Model.
5. Formulate a community action event where services for children are reviewed, revised, and constructed.
